WHAT IF - Hawker Hunter F3



The project to find a replacement jet fighter for the RAAF's CAC P-51 Mustangs and Vampires (which had yet to enter service), began in 1949 with a large assortment of types evaluated. The list included the Grumman F9F Panther and F-86 Sabre from the USA, the home grown CAC-23, and from Britain, three products from Hawker, the P.1052, P.1081 (04 Feb), and the P.1067, an aircraft that would be known as the Hunter, one of the most successful jet fighters of the period.

The Contenders



Hawker's experience with jet fighters started with the RR Nene powered Sea hawk and progressed through the similarly powered P.1052 and P.1081. The three had moved from the straight wing forms of the Sea Hawk through to the fully swept wings and tail plane of the P.1081, however, all three were rather portly due to the centrifugal flow Nene, so the next step was to fit the narrower axial-flow Avon engine. Not only did this make the aircraft way more streamlined, but the engine was much more powerful and had greater development potential.



The prototype P.1067 took to the air for the first time on 20 Jul 51. While the Hunter was a great aircraft, the performance of the F-86 Sabre in Korea had enhanced its desirability. This left the RAAF in a bit of a conundrum, so the obvious solution was to marry the Hunter's engine to the F-86's airframe to produce the CAC Avon Sabre.

RAAF Black Cats chronicles a little-known, yet crucial and courageous chapter in Australia's war history. While this story involved Australia and the United States, very few people on either side of the Pacific know of the significance the RAAF Catalina Squadrons had on the outcome of the war against Japan, and General Douglas MacArthur's triumphant 'return' to the Philippines.

Between 22 April 1943 and 1 July 1945, the crews of the RAAF's PBY Flying Boat (Catalina) Squadrons in coalition with the US 7th Fleet, conducted top-secret covert mine-laying missions in the South Pacific to disrupt Japanese naval supply and military operations. General Douglas MacArthur, particularly, believed mine-laying would be an effective weapon to stop the Japanese from supplying their forces, feeding their war-machine and, therefore, softening the enemy for US Army and Marine landings. He was proved right.

This is the powerful story of the brave Australian crews who flew some of the most dangerous missions of the Pacific War.

I was never much of a coffee person until I met Doc and I returned home an addict too (resolved quickly, I could no longer afford it). Doc was also prone to playing pranks. One morning I switched on my computer and was confronted by a flashing notice saying "EMERGENCY" in large red writing accompanied by loud beeping noises — not what you want to see when you are in a war zone! A careful look at the screen showed in much smaller writing "the price of coffee has gone up."

What does this story tell us? We shouldn't be "asleep" to important information that has a bearing on our health and well-being, or advice about on-line scams and the like, but we need to be decerning and check that information, so as not to be sucked in by "false news" or "conspiracy theories." This is not new to our age. The bible has a lot of verses that tell us to do just that. St Paul cautions his protégé Timothy: "The time will come when people will not listen to sound doctrine, but will follow their own desires and will collect for themselves more and more teachers who will tell them what they are itching to hear. They will turn away from listening to the truth and give their attention to legends" (2 Timothy 4:3-4).
