

After a slow start to these morning chats, we started to grow in numbers.


Because of your initial feedback we are keen to get these mornings going again in 2026. Previously, members indicated that they would prefer to try different coffee shops.

Contact **Ted** with your preferred venue so a list could be created and the calendar updated with each month's location – **so please let us know where you want to go.**


2026 Membership Fees

A BOOK in Review

Fatal Mission is the story of Australian navigator Oscar Furniss, just one of 55,000 young men who perished while flying for Bomber Command during World War II. Lovingly crafted by his nephew, Mal Elliott, this book brings to life a young man whose name was never spoken by his family and who was a stranger to his modern-day descendants. Elliott follows Oscar from his carefree childhood in the Blue Mountains through his training over the vast emptiness of Canada to the mist-shrouded patchwork landscapes of Britain and on to the hostile skies of occupied France. He uses the accounts of the two surviving aircrew to piece together the events of the fateful night that saw most of the crew of Lancaster JA901, affectionately known as Naughty Nan, perish as pilot Colin Dickson heroically manoeuvred his burning aircraft away from the towns and villages that dotted the landscape. This has been a difficult book for Elliott to write as it has a harrowing description of his uncle's last moments. The terrible impact of the deaths of the aircrew are vividly described alongside the miraculous tales of the two survivors. But for the family of Oscar Furniss there would be no miracle, just the lingering weight of deep and lasting grief. This is a story that moves beyond the technical descriptions of bombing missions to describe the human toll of conflict. It underlines the crucial importance of commemoration, of refusing to allow those who perished in war to be forgotten. Theirs was a sacrifice that we who live in freedom should never forget.

DVA NEWS

ESTABLISHMENT OF A NATIONAL ESO PEAK BODY

In late 2025 ESOs received a letter from Minister Matt Keogh addressing the establishment of a national peak body for ex-service organizations (ESOs) following a Royal Commission recommendation.

In summary the letter reported:

- The Royal Commission into Defence and Veteran Suicide recommended creating a national peak body for ESOs, emphasizing collaboration with the Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA).
- The peak body aims to provide a unified voice for ESOs, enhancing their representation in government discussions and improving veterans' access to quality services.
- The Australian Government has agreed-in-principle to this recommendation and allocated funding for ongoing consultations with ESOs
- Key challenges include ensuring appropriate governance, representation, and trust within the ESO sector.
- Minister Keogh expresses concern over some ESOs' reluctance to support the peak body and urges renewed commitment to the initiative.
- Feedback from the ESO community is sought to gauge support for collaboration on this project

The response

The RAAF Association Divisions (States) were asked to comment on the proposal put by the minister so a National consolidated response could be put forward. The response outlines the Air Force Association Ltd's commitment to developing a national peak body for ex-service organizations (ESOs) and provides recommendations for its establishment.

- AFA Ltd supports the creation of an independent peak body to engage with various government departments, emphasizing the need for independence from the Department of Veterans' Affairs to avoid perceived bias.
- AFA Ltd recommends forming a government-independent panel to develop a business case for the peak body, focusing on strategy, governance, risk management, and lobbying to enhance outcomes for veterans and their families.
- The association acknowledges alignment with findings from the 2025 ESO Peak Body consultation, particularly regarding

governance and funding options, suggesting a shared understanding of charitable peak body attributes within the ESO community.

- AFA Ltd notes the government's non-imposition stance on the peak body establishment and expresses a desire for regular updates on the progress of this initiative.

DVA Update

Subsequent to these submissions, DVA produced an update on the proposal. A summary of the document outlines the establishment of a national peak body for Ex-Service Organisations (ESOs) to support the veteran community in Australia.

- The Royal Commission into Defence and Veteran Suicide recommended creating a national ESO peak body to unify veterans and enhance their wellbeing.
- Consultations from 2024–2025 indicated strong support for this initiative, emphasizing that the ESO community should lead its establishment and operation.
- An ESO-based steering committee is developing a framework for the peak body, with support from the Department of Veterans' Affairs (DVA).
- Canadian Mr. Nick Booth, has no direct military association but is regarded as an international expert with extensive experience in veteran support, will engage with the community starting February 2026 to advise on governance and funding.
- The goal is to create a sustainable body that strengthens advocacy, improves service delivery, and ensures veterans' voices influence national policy.
- Interested parties can register for updates via the DVA email provided.

We wait patiently to see the outcomes in the consultant's report. The burning question will always be "will this peak body be truly INDEPENDENT?" You make up your own mind.
